North County Fire Protection District has created a Recognition Program for members of the community who go above and beyond to assist the organization and/or the community in times of need

SUMMARY:

On 5/21/2022, NCFPD Engineer Nick Crilly's son, Collin Crilly, was playing water polo with his club team, coached by Chaparral High School water polo and swim coach Josh Stone. The tournament was in Huntington Beach.

During pre-game warmups, Collin noticed a woman in the pool was having a medical emergency. She was unconscious with no pulse and not breathing. He quickly jumped into action taking control of the scene and directing numerous bystanders. He grabbed a backboard and pulled her out of the water. He initiated CPR, placed an AED on the patient, instructed bystanders on mouth-to-mask ventilations, and delivered one shock. Huntington Beach Fire Department arrived and took over patient care and upon arrival to the hospital, she was responsive and breathing on her own. On June 21st, 2022, Collin was recognized with a commendation by the Huntington Beach City Council for his acts of heroism.

The NCFPD would like to recognize Collin Crilly for his selfless actions helping a fellow citizen in need.



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FIRE MARSHAL

1.0. PURPOSE:

1.1. To provide a general description of the duties and responsibilities, qualifications and physical requirements for the classification of Fire Marshal with the North County Fire Protection District.

2.0. **POLICY**:

2.1. Members classified in the position of Fire Marshal are intended to meet the general personal and professional qualifications, perform the stated duties and responsibilities and other duties as assigned.

3.0. **INTENT:**

3.1. The intent of this Policy is to provide an overview of the general attributes and abilities necessary to perform the classification of Fire Marshal. It is also the intent to provide an overview of the typical duties and responsibilities of the position. This Policy is not intended to delineate every facet of the classification; other duties and responsibilities may be assigned as appropriate to fulfill the Mission of the District.

4.0. **GENERAL JOB POSITION:**

- 4.1. The Fire Marshal, under the direction of the Fire Chief/CEO, is exempt from the competitive service, is appointed by the Fire Chief/CEO and serves-as a member of the Fire Chief/CEO's Senior/Executive Staffat the pleasure of the Fire Chief/CEO. The Fire Marshal has a Division Chief classification and is considered an "Exempt" employee as defined by FLSA and is not overtime eligible. Specifics of compensation and benefits are described in the Memorandum of Understanding between the Management bargaining group and the District. The position is a Safety position as defined by PERS.
 - This position is salaried, overtime exempt as defined by applicable labor law and is classified as a "Miscellaneous Employee" as it pertains to CalPERS retirement benefits.
- 4.1.4.2. The Fire Marshal provides leadership to the Department of Fire Prevention/Community Risk Reduction and serves as the District's Fire Code Official in all aspects of State and local Fire Code development, interpretation, and enforcement.

4.2.4.3. WORK HOURS: The employee works either a standard 40-workweek or alternatively a 9/80 schedule, from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday/Friday (or other schedules as needed to meet Department needs).

5.0. REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES:

- 5.1. Under administrative direction of the Fire Chief/CEO, the Fire Marshal:
 - 5.1.1. Oversees Community Risk Reduction Division the Fire Prevention Bureau, develops, implements and manages programs within the Division and Bureau, supervises Division Fire Prevention staff.
 - 5.1.2. Attends related local and regional meetings pertaining to duties and responsibilities of the position.
 - 5.1.3. Works closely with local and regional planning and sponsor groups to develop and implement fire and safety codes.
 - 5.1.4. Maintains a working relationship with other Community Risk Reduction fire prevention agencies bureaus and County agencies such as building, planning, public works and code enforcement.
 - 5.1.5. Serves as a member of the Fire Chief/CEO's Executive Staff and assists in formulation and administration of general policies, budgets, rules and regulations, practices and procedures, governing personnel and Department operations.
 - 5.1.6. Provides training and coordination to Fire Department personnel in fire prevention and protection techniques; coordinates assigned activities with other divisions, departments and outside agencies.
 - 5.1.7. Provides highly responsible and complex oversight of the-Community Risk Reduction DivisionFire-Prevention Bureau, makes recommendations and supports the Fire Chief/CEO on Community Risk Reduction Fire Prevention matters.
 - 5.1.8. Develops, interprets and enforces local and State fire and safety laws. Conducts and oversees fire origin/cause and other fire enforcement investigations, interfaces with law enforcement and performs courtroom testimonies in accordance with the Investigation Manual and other departmental policies.

6.0. MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS:

6.1. EDUCATION:

- 6.1.1. Possession of a Bachelor's Degree in Fire Science, Fire Administration, Fire Protection Engineering, Public Administration, Business Administration or a closely related field, from a regionally accredited university.
- 6.1.2. Consideration for provisional appointment may be given for possession of all educational & certification requirements other than a Bachelor's degree.

6.2. LICENSE/CERTIFICATION:

6.2.1. California Class "C" Driver's License (must maintain insurability by the District's liability carrier);

6.2.2.1.1.1. OSFM-Fire Marshal Certification:

- 6.2.3.6.2.2. ICC Fire Inspector I Certification; and
- 6.2.4.6.2.3. Within one (1) year of assignment, the employee will be required to complete successfully PC 832 certification (non-firearms portion only).
- 6.2.5.6.2.4. OSFM Fire Marshal Certification is highly desirable.





RECOMMENDATION:

Review the report as submitted. In looking at the overall percentage of satisfaction with our service, our customers continue to rate their level of satisfaction overwhelmingly in the "excellent" category.

BACKGROUND:

This report focuses on two areas, direct feedback based on surveys sent to patients transported by North County Fire and our Service/Sympathy card program. The distribution of the survey is based on the 2022 Payer Class percentages according to our ambulance billing company, Wittman Enterprises. This quarter's customer satisfaction results incorporate surveys received from April 1st, 2022 through June 31st, 2022. The following is a listing of the type and number of individual payer classes that are randomly mailed surveys on a monthly basis.


DISCUSSION:

The survey results are reported on quarterly intervals to all safety employees. The sharing of this information with all employees provides a heightened awareness regarding our customer's experience in the field. If a system or human deficiency trend is noted, the management staff will coordinate any measures necessary to correct the problem.

The first section of the *Satisfaction Survey Form* evaluates the customer's overall satisfaction with our service by rating it from "Excellent" to "Poor." The second section of the form allows the customer to provide comments on their perception of the service they received. This quarter 300 surveys were mailed, and 115 surveys were returned (38%).

Ninety three percent (96%), or 110, of the surveys returned indicated "excellent" customer satisfaction as indicated on the chart below:

The customer comment portion of the survey has proven to be most effective by allowing us to hear the customer's opinions or concerns firsthand, thus allowing us to mitigate any problems as quickly as possible. These comments are reported on *Attachment-A* of this report.

In order to maintain Continual Quality Improvement (CQI) for this program, the responses are reviewed for any unusual comments or areas of concern. When necessary, incident documents will be reviewed. If a poor rating or adverse report is noted, the Operations Chief reaches out to seek clarification and ultimately improve services. If indicated, this review may warrant further investigation or training to mitigate potential customer service issues.

SERVICE/SYMPATHY CARD PROGRAM:

The District continues to utilize a Service/Sympathy Card Program to promote excellence in our emergency delivery services. This particular program allows our firefighters to correspond with our customers by personally signing and mailing "Service Cards." This post-incident program has proven invaluable in maintaining a positive relationship with our community through personal contact between our firefighters and the customers they serve. The "Sympathy Cards" are utilized in the same way by corresponding concern with a deceased patient's family.

The above numbers represent 38% of total cards sent by A Shift, 52% of total cards sent by B Shift and 1% of total cards sent by C Shift.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

The increased use of Service Cards has contributed to increased expenditures in both printing and postage. Annually, the Program costs approximately \$2,000.00 to operate. It is our belief that enhanced public relations and the benefits these cards represent is worth the expenditure.

SUMMARY:

The North County Fire Protection District takes seriously the demeanor and professional conduct of its employees while providing emergency services. Our Customer Survey Program provides a tool to measure and quantify this area and if necessary, implement and/or modify the emergency delivery system to ensure its ability to meet customer expectations. This program, which is now in its seventeenth year, consistently reflects a high degree of satisfaction with the services delivered by the employees of the North County Fire Protection District, beginning from the request for service up to and including final mitigation of the incident.

BACKGROUND:

This annual report is intended to provide the Board with information pertaining to the condition and status of the NCFPD fleet of vehicles. Fleet maintenance is responsible for the maintenance and repair of all NCFPD vehicles, generators and other associated power equipment and tools.

DISCUSSION:

The Fleet Supervisor and fire mechanic in Fleet Services work diligently to repair and maintain the Districts fleet of vehicles, facility generators and multiple other pieces of smaller power equipment. It is worth mentioning that having this very specialized fleet services capability within our own agency is of tremendous value. Having this capability in-house not only allows for detailed preventative maintenance which ultimately reduces out of service times on vehicles, but the service center also performs a variety of other specialty functions that would otherwise have to be sublet out to other vendors, which would have a significantly higher financial impact to the District.

During FY20/21 the District placed an order for three F150 Pickup trucks to replace aging Chief Officer and the Fire Marshal vehicles. The delivery of these vehicles has been delayed due to Covid and supply chain issues. The project has been caried over to FY22/23.

RECOMMENDATION:

BACKGROUND:

The purpose of the district's training program is to ensure a state of readiness with the skills and knowledge necessary to respond and perform both emergency and non-emergency operations effectively, efficiently, and safely. Minimum established monthly training hours for Safety members (20 hours) meet requirements established by the Insurance Services Office (ISO) and industry standards. In addition, the training program ensures compliance with various Local, State and Federal mandates regarding training of emergency personnel.

DISCUSSION:

The NCFPD Training Division continues to serve all the various ranks and groups in the organization. Chief Officers, Captains, Engineers, Firefighters, Single Role EMT's, Paramedics, Support Staff, and Administrative Staff all receive training on various levels. We not only provide and support in-house training, but a considerable amount of external training such as the Palomar College Fire Academy and Emergency Education Program, North Zone Joint Training, and Regional Training.

The Training Division has been able to participate in several multi-company training events. These trainings exercises replicate real incidents and help us provide instruction that meets or exceeds minimum standards. Here are some of the highlights of this year's training to date:

- SDGE Incident Command and Chiefs Training
- San Diego County Wildland Drill
- VHF Communication Structural Firefighting

- Blue Card Sets and Reps
- Swift Water Rescue Training

Emergency Medical Education also remains a high priority to keep our personnel highly trained in Emergency Medical Service skills and abilities.

Battalion Chief Barry Krumwiede and Captain Pete August are responsible for finalizing the monthly training calendar and coordinating the training curriculum with the Training Cadre lead instructors.

The Training Division in collaboration with Nancy Goss from Human Resources, completed new hire and promotional testing to include Single Role EMT and Paramedic, Firefighter/Paramedic, and Captain.

The Training Division has also partnered with the California Firefighter Joint Apprenticeship Committee (Cal-Jac). Eight probationary employees are enrolled in the program with the district receiving reimbursements for their monthly training. These reimbursements can be utilized for future training events and/or equipment. Capt. Collin Baker manages the NCF Cal-Jac program.

Lastly, thank you to the crew training cadre leads and members who help provide quality training for the entire department.





RECOMMENDATION:

That the NCFPD Board of Directors adopt the proposed Final NCFPD Strategic Plan.

BACKGROUND:

In August 2021 the Board awarded *Matrix Consulting Group* a contract to conduct an organizational Strategic Plan. The intent of the plan was to identify strategic direction for the next 3-5 years with 20-year strategic considerations.

DISCUSSION:

For the last 11 months, an organizational analysis was conducted by *Matrix Consulting Group* which included a review of existing agency procedures, policies, reports, and plans. The analysis involved interviewing members of the organization including the Board of Directors. The community was also asked to participate through a community forum and a comprehensive widely distributed agency community survey. From the many months of analysis, Matrix created an organizational Strategic Plan for the NCFPD. The plan includes identified "strategic goals" which are categorized into short, intermediate, and long-range capital type goals.

Fiscal Analysis:

The strategic plan was developed in compliance with the contracted scope of work that was awarded in the \$72,000 contract which included all fees and expenses.

Summary:

The draft plan has been reviewed by the executive leadership team. As a result of our review, we feel that the plan as presented accurately identifies goals that have been identified as strategic direction priorities by our stakeholders. When approved, this plan will provide guidance and direction for District decision making and governance for years to come.

ACTION AGENDA

RECOMMENDATION:

- That the Board of Directors adopt NCFPD Resolution 2022-15 authorizing participation in PARS Section 115 Post-Employment Benefits Trust Program.
- Appoint the District Finance Manager as the Plan Administrator.

BACKGROUND:

The District provides its employees with a defined benefit pension through the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS). In 2020, the District took advantage of low interest borrowing costs to establish a Pension Obligation Bond (POB) to refinance its CalPERS unfunded liability and as a result realized significant savings.

DISCUSSION:

The District is anticipating that CalPERS will continue to enact changes to increase the financial stability of its pension program. Those changes will involve higher District contributions and new unfunded actuarial liability (UAL). To address this liability, Staff feels it would be beneficial to establish a Section 115 Trust. A Section 115 Trust is a vehicle authorized by the Internal Revenue Code which allows an agency to segregate funds from general assets for the purpose of funding an essential governmental function (i.e., pension obligations). Funds placed in a Section 115 Trust are irrevocably committed for the specific government function specified in the applicable trust agreement. Additionally, monies held in such trusts can be invested in accordance with the rules governing those trusts, which are different than investment rules for the District's General Fund investments. To that end, setting aside funds in a Section 115 Trust, the District can potentially earn a higher rate of return than if funds were invested in General Fund investments.

Establishing a Section 115 Trust to prefund pension obligation is a best practice recommended by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA). Some of the benefits that a Section 115 Trust program can provide our District include the following:

- · A means for achieving the District's pension funding goal
- An opportunity to improve the District's overall credit rating, since it demonstrates the District's proactive approach to addressing its long-term liabilities
- An opportunity to earn higher investment returns, since a Section 115 Trust allows investment in a wider array of investment options compared to restrictions on General Fund investments (Govt. Code 53216)
- An opportunity to decrease risk through diversification of plan assets using different asset management approaches

PARS is a leading provider of Section 115 Trusts for governmental entities. In an effort to help public agencies address and manage their post-employment liabilities, PARS has developed the PARS Post-Employment Benefits Trust Program (PARS Program). The PARS Program has been established as a multiple-employer trust, and any public agency, regardless of size, can join the program and benefit from the economies of scale keeping administrative fees low. Additionally, PARS has partnered with U.S. Bank to serve as trustee and its subadvisor, HighMark Capital Management, Inc., to provide investment management services for the program. It should be noted that, although the funds will be held in a trust, the District still has control of fund management selection.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

There is no cost to set up the Section 115 Trust. The trust is recommended to be funded all or in part by the annual savings generated by the District's established Pension Obligation Bond (POB). Costs to implement the Section 115 Trust are minimal. Ongoing fees with PARS (Trust Administration/Consulting Fees) range from 0.25% down to 0.10% for assets \$0-50 million. The fees with US Bank/HighMark Capital Management (Discretionary Trustee/Investment Management Fees) range from 0.35%-0.10%, for assets \$0-\$50 million. It is likely we will stay within the \$0-\$10 million range at 0.25%/0.35%, respectively.

SUMMARY:

In conjunction with our POB, a Section 115 Trust will assure the District fully maximizes our efforts of addressing future UAL. This two-prong approach would provide the District with even greater financial stability through the designation of a funding source to offset future UAL obligations therefore providing pension rate stabilization.

WHEREAS, the District's adoption and operation of the Program has no effect on any current or former employee's entitlement to post-employment benefits; and

WHEREAS, the terms and conditions of post-employment benefit entitlement, if any, are governed by contracts separate from and independent of the Program; and

WHEREAS, the District's funding of the Program does not, and is not intended to, create any new vested right to any benefit nor strengthen any existing vested right; and

WHEREAS, the District reserves the right to make contributions, if any, to the Program.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The Board of Directors hereby adopts the PARS Public Agencies Post-Employment Benefits Trust, effective July 26, 2022; and
- 2. The Board hereby appoints the Finance Manager, or his/her successor or his/her designee as the District's Plan Administrator for the Program; and
- 3. The District's Plan Administrator is hereby authorized to execute the PARS legal and administrative documents on behalf of the District and to take whatever additional actions are necessary to maintain the District's participation in the Program and to maintain compliance of any relevant regulation issued or as may be issued; therefore, authorizing him/her to take whatever additional actions are required to administer the District's Program.

WHEREAS, the Agency has adopted the PARS Public Agencies Post-Employment Benefits Trust for the purpose of pre-funding pension obligations and/or Other Post-Employment Benefits ("OPEB") obligations ("Plan") and is desirous of retaining PARS as Trust Administrator to the Trust, to provide administrative services.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree:

- 1. Services. PARS will provide the services pertaining to the Plan as described in the exhibit attached hereto as "Exhibit 1A" ("Services") in a timely manner, subject to the further provisions of this Agreement.
- 2. Fees for Services. PARS will be compensated for performance of the Services as described in the exhibit attached hereto as "Exhibit 1B".
- 3. Payment Terms. Payment for the Services will be remitted directly from Plan assets unless the Agency chooses to make payment directly to PARS. In the event that the Agency chooses to make payment directly to PARS, it shall be the responsibility of the Agency to remit payment directly to PARS based upon an invoice prepared by PARS and delivered to the Agency. If payment is not received by PARS within thirty (30) days of the invoice delivery date, the balance due shall bear interest at the rate of 1.5% per month. If payment is not received from the Agency within sixty (60) days of the invoice delivery date, payment plus accrued interest will be remitted directly from Plan assets, unless PARS has previously received written communication disputing the subject invoice that is signed by a duly authorized representative of the Agency.
- 4. Fees for Services Beyond Scope. Fees for services beyond those specified in this Agreement will be billed to the Agency at the rates indicated in the PARS' standard fee schedule in effect at the time the services are provided and shall be payable as described in Section 3 of this Agreement. Before any such services are performed, PARS will provide the Agency with a detailed description of the services, terms, and applicable rates for such services. Such services, terms, and applicable rates shall be agreed upon in writing and executed by both parties.
- 5. Information Furnished to PARS. PARS will provide the Services contingent upon the Agency providing PARS the information specified in the exhibit attached hereto as "Exhibit 1C" ("Data"). It shall be the responsibility of the Agency to certify the accuracy, content, and completeness of the Data so that PARS may rely on such information without further audit. It shall further be the responsibility of the Agency to deliver the Data to PARS in such a manner that allows for a reasonable amount of time for the Services to be performed. Unless specified in Exhibit 1A, PARS shall be under no duty to question Data received from the Agency, to compute contributions made to the

Plan, to determine or inquire whether contributions are adequate to meet and discharge liabilities under the Plan, or to determine or inquire whether contributions made to the Plan are in compliance with the Plan or applicable law. In addition, PARS shall not be liable for nonperformance of Services to the extent such nonperformance is caused by or results from erroneous and/or late delivery of Data from the Agency. In the event that the Agency fails to provide Data in a complete, accurate and timely manner and pursuant to the specifications in Exhibit 1C, PARS reserves the right, notwithstanding the further provisions of this Agreement, to terminate this Agreement upon no less than ninety (90) days written notice to the Agency.

- 6. Records. Throughout the duration of this Agreement, and for a period of five (5) years after termination of this Agreement, PARS shall provide duly authorized representatives of Agency access to all records and material relating to calculation of PARS' fees under this Agreement. Such access shall include the right to inspect, audit and reproduce such records and material and to verify reports furnished in compliance with the provisions of this Agreement. All information so obtained shall be accorded confidential treatment as provided under applicable law.
- 7. Confidentiality. Without the Agency's consent, PARS shall not disclose any information relating to the Plan except to duly authorized officials of the Agency, subject to applicable law, and to parties retained by PARS to perform specific services within this Agreement. The Agency shall not disclose any information relating to the Plan to individuals not employed by the Agency without the prior written consent of PARS, except as such disclosures may be required by applicable law.
- 8. Independent Contractor. PARS is and at all times hereunder shall be an independent contractor. As such, neither the Agency nor any of its officers, employees or agents shall have the power to control the conduct of PARS, its officers, employees, or agents, except as specifically set forth and provided for herein. PARS shall pay all wages, salaries, and other amounts due its employees in connection with this Agreement and shall be responsible for all reports and obligations respecting them, such as social security, income tax withholding, unemployment compensation, workers' compensation, and similar matters.
- 9. Indemnification. PARS and Agency hereby indemnify each other and hold the other harmless, including their respective officers, directors, and employees, from any claim, loss, demand, liability, or expense, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, incurred by the other as a consequence of, to the extent, PARS' or Agency's, as the case may be, negligent acts, errors or omissions with respect to the performance of their respective duties hereunder.
- 10. Compliance with Applicable Law. The Agency shall observe and comply with federal, state, and local laws in effect when this Agreement is executed, or which may come into effect during the term of this Agreement, regarding the administration of the Plan. PARS shall observe and comply with federal, state, and local laws in effect when this Agreement is executed, or which may come into effect during the term of this Agreement, regarding Plan administrative services provided under this Agreement.

- 11. Applicable Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. In the event any party institutes legal proceedings to enforce or interpret this Agreement, venue and jurisdiction shall be in any state court of competent jurisdiction.
- 12. Force Majeure. When a party's nonperformance hereunder was beyond the control and not due to the fault of the party not performing, a party shall be excused from performing its obligations under this Agreement during the time and to the extent that its performance is prevented by such cause. Such cause shall include, but not be limited to: any incidence of fire, flood, acts of God or unanticipated communicable disease, acts of terrorism or war commandeering of material, products, plants or facilities by the federal, state or local government, a material act or omission by the other party or any law, ordinance, rule, guidance or recommendation by the federal, state or local government, or any agency thereof, which becomes effective after the date of this Agreement that delays or renders impractical either party's performance under the Agreement.
- 13. Ownership of Reports and Documents. The originals of all letters, documents, reports, and data produced for the purposes of this Agreement shall be delivered to and become the property of the Agency. Copies may be made for PARS but shall not be furnished to others without written authorization from Agency.
- 14. **Designees.** The Plan Administrator of the Agency, or their designee, shall have the authority to act for and exercise any of the rights of the Agency as set forth in this Agreement, subsequent to and in accordance with the written authority granted by the Governing Body of the Agency, a copy of which writing shall be delivered to PARS. Any officer of PARS, or his or her designees, shall have the authority to act for and exercise any of the rights of PARS as set forth in this Agreement.
- 15. Notices. All notices hereunder and communications regarding the interpretation of the terms of this Agreement, or changes thereto, shall be effected by delivery of the notices in person or by depositing the notices in the U.S. mail, registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid and addressed as follows:
 - (A) To PARS: PARS; 4350 Von Karman Avenue, Suite 100, Newport Beach, CA 92660; Attention: President
 - (B) To Agency: [Agency]; [Agency Address]; Attention: [Plan Administrator Title] Notices shall be deemed given on the date received by the addressee.
- 16. Term of Agreement. This Agreement shall remain in effect for the period beginning _______, 2022 and ending ________, 2025 ("Term"). This Agreement may be terminated at any time by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the other party of the intent to terminate. Absent a thirty (30) day written notice to the other party of the intent to terminate, this Agreement will continue unchanged for successive twelve-month periods following the Term.
- 17. Amendment. This Agreement may not be amended orally, but only by a written instrument executed by the parties hereto.

- 18. Entire Agreement. This Agreement, including exhibits, contains the entire understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter set forth in this Agreement. In the event a conflict arises between the parties with respect to any term, condition or provision of this Agreement, the remaining terms, conditions, and provisions shall remain in full force and legal effect. No waiver of any term or condition of this Agreement by any party shall be construed by the other as a continuing waiver of such term or condition.
- 19. Attorneys Fees. In the event any action is taken by a party hereto to enforce the terms of this Agreement the prevailing party herein shall be entitled to receive its reasonable attorney's fees.
- 20. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, and in that event, each counterpart shall be deemed a complete original and be enforceable without reference to any other counterpart.
- 21. **Headings.** Headings in this Agreement are for convenience only and shall not be used to interpret or construe its provisions.
- 22. Effective Date. This Agreement shall be effective on the date first above written, and also shall be the date the Agreement is executed.

BACKGROUND:

The District is required to adopt a Multi-Year Facilities and Equipment Plan to participate in the San Diego County Fire Mitigation Fee (FMF) program. FMF funds are restricted and can only be used for capital improvement projects. In FY 21/22 our FMF funds were approved to be allocated toward the future replacement of Fire Station #4. The Multi-Year Plan is required to be updated annually.

DISCUSSION:

Staff has developed a FMF Multi-Year Facilities and Equipment Plan for the next five (5) years. The adoptive Resolution and mitigation expenditure justification letter will be sent to the County once approved. The plan identifies that the District will utilize the FMF funds for the future replacement of Fire Station #4.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

The projected Fire Mitigation Fee Revenue for FY 2022/2023 is anticipated to be approximately \$215,000 from fees and interest.

Please review and approve the use of mitigation funds for the North County Fire Protection District (NCFPD).

BACKGROUND:

Over the past decade, growth driven by new development has had a significant impact on the North County Fire Protection District (NCFPD). Using information provided by SANDAG, between the years 2018 and 2050, the area served by the District will grow by nearly 25,000 residents (a 50% increase), thereby increasing our anticipated call volume by 50%. Since 1990 our call volume has escalated from 70 calls per thousand to over 120 calls per thousand.

The District is seeking authorization to utilize FMF funds for the future replacement of NCFPD Fire Station #4, currently located at 4375 Pala Mesa Dr., Fallbrook. This fire station serves the I-15/SR-76 region, an area that has experienced much of the District's new growth. The use of FMF funds for this facility was originally approved by the FMF Committee in FY 02/03 and most recently in FY 21/22. The anticipated total cost for the construction of a new fire station is \$8.0M. I have attached the NCFPD Fire Mitigation Fee Multi-Year Facilities and Equipment Plan Resolution for your review.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Board approve and authorize the Administrative Staff to deliver the Fixed Charge Special Assessment forms to San Diego Property Tax Services on or before the deadline of August 10th, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

Community Risk Reduction is responsible for the annual weed abatement of properties with hazardous growth that is not maintained by property owners. Throughout the year, Staff has mailed weed abatement notices to those property owners who have a known or existing fire hazard on their parcel(s). The District maintains a Special Services Agreement with California Tree Services, Inc. to bring specifically hazardous properties into compliance with North County Fire Protection District's Ordinance No. 2000-01.

Property owners are required to remove dead/dying vegetation and annual growth from their property, maintaining the parcel in accordance with the District's Ordinance. Those who have failed to comply with District notices to abate within a specified time period have been brought to compliance by the District's Special Service contractor. The property owners have been invoiced for the final costs and fees associated with abating their parcel.

DISCUSSION:

The majority of property owners who received a Notice to Abate willingly complied within the timeframe allowed; however, some parcels were cleared by the Fire District. Administrative Staff has mailed courtesy notices and invoices requesting payment to the following non-compliant property owners:

BACKGROUND:

Senate Bill 1205, codified in September 2018 as Health & Safety Code §13146.4, requires annual reporting of completed inspections for certain "State Mandated" occupancies during the "budget appropriations process." The purpose of this legislation is for governing bodies to determine the adequacy of its fire prevention activities, particularly as it relates to obligatory requirements, so that it can adjust future appropriations for prevention activities accordingly. As we have now just completed the 21/22 fiscal year, Staff is providing this report to the Board for consideration.

DISCUSSION:

The District is required to report on the number of educational facilities and the number of certain congregate residential facilities present within its jurisdiction, and the percent of inspections completed for both types. As noted in the Resolution, there are 15 educational facilities and 136 congregate residential facilities. All state mandated R occupancies were completed. Single family dwellings are excluded from this legislative inspection requirement.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

No fiscal impact at this time.

SUMMARY:

The District has conducted its state mandated inspections.

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code §13146.2 requires all fire departments, that provide fire protection services, including the North County Fire Protection District, to report annually to its administering authority on its compliance with California Health & Safety Code §13146.2 and §13146.3; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of North County Fire Protection District intends this Resolution to fulfill the requirements of the California Health & Safety Code regarding acknowledgment of the North County Fire Protection District's compliance with California Health and Safety Code §13146.2 and §13146.3.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the North County Fire Protection District expressly acknowledges the measure of compliance of the North County Fire Protection District with California Health and Safety Code §13146.2 and §13146.3 in the area encompassed by the North County Fire Protection District, as follows:

1.0. EDUCATIONAL GROUP "E" OCCUPANCIES:

1.1. Educational Group E occupancies are generally those public and private schools, used by more than six (6) persons at any one time for educational purposes through the twelfth (12th) grade. Within the North County Fire Protection District, there lie 15 Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities.

- 1.2. During F/Y 2021/2022, the North County Fire Protection District completed the annual inspection of 15 Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. This is a compliance rate of 100% for this reporting period.
- 1.3. Additional items of note regarding this compliance rate can be found in the accompanying staff report for this Resolution.

2.0. RESIDENTIAL GROUP "R" OCCUPANCIES:

- 2.1. Residential Group R occupancies, for the purposes of this Resolution, are generally those occupancies containing sleeping units and include hotels, motels, apartments (three units or more), etc., as well as other residential occupancies (including a number of residential care facilities). These residential care facilities have a number of different sub-classifications and they may contain residents or clients that have a range of needs, including those related to custodial care, mobility impairments, cognitive disabilities, etc. The residents may also be non-ambulatory or bedridden.
- 2.2. During F/Y 2021/2022, the North County Fire Protection District performed initial annual inspection of 136 Group R occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. All state mandated R occupancies were completed.
- 2.3. Additional items of note regarding this compliance rate can be found in the accompanying Staff report for this Resolution.

DISCUSSION:

Over the last fiscal year and into FY22/23, the District has experienced a positive increase of tax revenue. The Preliminary Budget presented herein, reflects a spending plan for the upcoming fiscal year that will allow the District to meet routine operational needs and remain in the black. The budget allows the Board to analyze overall cash position.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

REVENUE: The District is anticipating an approximate increase in property tax revenue of \$184,000 over budgeted in FY 21/22. Ambulance fees were over budgeted in prior year due to high COVID year. This year projections were based on actual. Prevention fees were exceedingly high in FY 21/22. They are not anticipated to be as excessive in FY 22/23. Tower Lease agreements decreased considerably due to only one tower lease this fiscal year.

EXPENSES: Salaries increased 6.32%, which includes the approximate projection of a 2.5% salary increase. Healthcare is projected to rise 5%, but will be adjusted at the final budget once numbers are received from PERS. Unfunded Accrued Liability (UAL) has an increase of 22% over last year's budgeted amount.

SUMMARY:

Staff recommends the Board to adopt the attached Preliminary Budget and set the hearing as requested herein.






DISCUSSION:

2022 Conflict of Interest Code Biennial Notice Instructions for Local Agencies

The Political Reform Act requires every local government agency to review its conflict of interest code biennially. A conflict of interest code tells public officials, governmental employees, and consultants what financial interests they must disclose on their Statement of Economic Interests (Form 700).

By **July 1, 2022:** The code reviewing body must notify agencies and special districts within its jurisdiction to review their conflict of interest codes.

By October 3, 2022: The biennial notice must be filed with the agency's code reviewing body.

The FPPC has prepared a 2022 Local Agency Biennial Notice form for local agencies to complete or send to agencies within its jurisdiction to complete before submitting to the code reviewing body. The City Council is the code reviewing body for city agencies. The County Board of Supervisors is the code reviewing body for county agencies and any other local government agency whose jurisdiction is determined to be solely within the county (e.g., school districts, including certain charter schools). The FPPC is the code reviewing body for any agency with jurisdiction in *more than one county* and will contact them.

The Local Agency Biennial Notice is not forwarded to the FPPC.

If amendments to an agency's conflict of interest code are necessary, the amended code must be forwarded to the code reviewing body for approval within 90 days. An agency's amended code is not effective until it has been approved by the code reviewing body.

If you answer yes, to any of the questions below, your agency's code probably needs to be amended.

- · Is the current code more than five years old?
- Have there been any substantial changes to the agency's organizational structure since the last code was approved?
- Have any positions been eliminated or re-named since the last code was approved?
- Have any new positions been added since the last code was approved?
- Have there been any substantial changes in duties or responsibilities for any positions since the last code was approved?

ACTION AGENDA

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board authorizes the continued deployment of a BLS ambulance to the North Zone for an additional three (3) months.

BACKGROUND:

During the March 2022 Board meeting, the Board approved the trial of a Basic Life Support (BLS) ambulance staffed with two (2) Single-Role Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) to the North Zone to assist with ambulance service surge capacity.

DISCUSSION:

The BLS ambulance was placed into service on April 11, 2022, as a 12-hour resource stationed at Vista Fire Department Station #6. Since that time, 60 days' worth of data has been collected.

From April 11, 2022, to June 11, 2022, the BLS ambulance responded to a total of 354 incidents within the jurisdictions of Vista, Oceanside, Carlsbad, and North County Fire. Of those 354 incidents, the ambulance transported 166 times for a daily transport average of 2.7 transports per 12-hour shift. In reviewing the automatic aid given and received data from this same time the data suggests that the BLS ambulance is having a positive impact by balancing the aid given and received between the cities of Vista, Carlsbad, and Oceanside.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

During the first 60 days of operation the personnel costs for the BLS ambulance were approximately \$29,000. Other operating expenses such as fuel and supplies were approximately \$10,000. Based on the information received from the districts 3rd party billing administrator, the ambulance transport revenue for the first 60 days is approximately \$48,000.

Based on these findings, the preliminary data suggests that the BLS ambulance is currently operating in a financially sustainable manner with <u>potential</u> revenue earnings of \$9,000 for the first 60 days of operation. Staff will continue to monitor the collections closely to ensure the estimated revenue is realized.

SUMMARY:

Preliminary response data is indicating that the BLS ambulance is having a positive impact to the North Zone ambulance delivery system while supporting operating costs through transport revenue. This resource has accomplished its mission to provide the North Zone ambulance delivery system surge capacity, preserving the North Zone ambulance delivery system in its entirety.

U.S. Supreme Court Issues Two Decisions Impacting Local Sign Regulations and Flag Policies

Municipalities throughout the country regulate signs and set policy for flag-flying on public property. Done right, these are lawful functions of local government; done wrong, they can be First Amendment landmines. Two recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions refine the map to navigate this landscape.

Shurtleff v. City of Boston (Flags)

Shurtleff v. City of Boston involved a dispute over Boston's denial of a request to fly a religious flag outside City Hall. Boston had allowed private groups to hold flag-raising ceremonies outside City Hall during which groups could replace the city flag with a flag of that group's choosing. From 2005 to 2017, Boston approved the raising of approximately 50 unique flags at 284 ceremonies.

The case began after the director of an organization called "Camp Constitution" asked to fly the "Christian flag"—which, according to Court documents, displayed a red cross on a blue field against a white background—during an event that would commemorate the "civil and social contributions of the Christian community." City staff denied the request, citing concerns that flying a religious flag at City Hall would violate the Establishment Clause and that the City had no precedent for flying such a flag. Camp Constitution sued, claiming that Boston's denial violated the First Amendment's Free Speech Clause. The District Court sided with Boston, holding that flying private groups' flags on City Hall property constituted "government speech" under the First Amendment, which allowed Boston to refuse the flag request. The First Circuit affirmed.

The Supreme Court reversed, holding that the flag raisings in question amounted to private—not government—speech due to Boston's "lack of meaningful involvement in the selection of flags or the crafting of their messages." In support of this holding, the Court observed that Boston had no written policy or internal guidance regarding which flags non-municipal groups could fly and what message those flags might communicate. Instead, Boston had a "come one, come all" attitude toward private groups' flags; the city had never denied a private group's flag request before this case. Upon classifying the flag raisings as private speech, the Court concluded that Boston's refusal to let Camp Constitution fly its flag violated the Free Speech Clause of the First Amendment.

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The Court advised that Boston was free to change its policies to "make clear that it wished to speak for itself by raising flags." Tellingly, the Court cited approvingly the flag policy adopted by San Jose, California. The Court liked that the San Jose policy includes language stating that San Jose's "flagpoles are not intended to serve as a forum for free-expression by the public" and limited its approval of flags flown to those that constitute "an expression of the City's official sentiments." The Court's quasi-endorsement of San Jose's policy strongly suggests that local flag policies with these features would qualify as government speech allowing a city to permit or reject flying of a flag consistent with the policies.

City of Austin, Texas v. Reagan National Advertising of Austin (Signs)

This decision involved the Supreme Court's revisiting of its holding in *Reed v. Town of Gilbert, Arizona*. As a recap: in Reed, the Court struck down portions of the Gilbert, Arizona sign code that subjected ideological, political and directional signs to different rules with respect to size, location and length of display time. The Court characterized this regulatory scheme as "content-based" on its face because it subjected signs to different rules depending upon the message conveyed—whether ideological, political or directional. Under the Court's First Amendment precedents, content-based restrictions are subject to "strict scrutiny" and are "presumptively unconstitutional ... [unless] the government proves they are narrowly tailored to serve a compelling government interest." In Reed, Gilbert failed to meet this standard.

The Court's decision in City of Austin, Texas v. Reagan National Advertising of Austin centered on provisions in Austin's sign code that allowed on-premises signs-but not offpremises signs—to be digitized. The Court characterized off-premises signs as those that "advertise things that are not located on the same premises as the sign, as well as signs that direct people to offsite locations." The plaintiff, who owned billboards throughout Austin, argued that the sign code's separate rules for off-premises and on-premises signs violated the Free Speech Clause of the First Amendment. The District Court sided with Austin, finding that the on/off premises distinction giving wider latitude to on-site advertising was content-neutral under Reed. The distinction did not impose greater restrictions for political messages, religious messages, or any other subject matter, but only required city decision-makers, property owners, advertisers and the public to determine whether the subject matter is located on the same property as the sign. The Fifth Circuit reversed, holding that the "the fact that a government official has to read a sign's message to determine the sign's purpose is enough to render a regulation content based and subject to strict scrutiny." Taken to its extreme, this holding would require that a code allowing onpremises advertising allow any advertising message (i.e., not just business identification) on that premises.

The Supreme Court reversed the Fifth Circuit's decision, reasoning that content-based restrictions subject to heightened scrutiny are those that "discriminate based on the topic discussed or the idea or message expressed." Austin's on/off-premises sign standards did none of these things; they were simply "location based and content-agnostic" standards

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that "did not single out specific subject matter for differential treatment." Accordingly, the Court held that the on/off-premises sign standards were content neutral and subject to "intermediate scrutiny"—a standard of review that requires Austin to show that its on/off-premises sign distinction is "narrowly tailored to serve a significant government interest." This decision aligns the Court's guidance more closely with Justice Kagan's concurring opinion in Reed, where the purpose of the sign (e.g., litter prevention or to show that "George Washington Slept Here") could serve to justify some disparate messaging opportunities in the absence of any official message suppression. Justice Kagan had reasoned—and the Court now held—that in these cases, intermediate scrutiny is appropriate. Justice Kagan thought Gilbert's ordinance failed both tests, noting that it did not pass "strict scrutiny, or intermediate scrutiny, or even the laugh test." The Court sent the case back to the lower court to determine whether Austin's code could satisfy this requirement.

Next Steps and Takeaways

In light of the decision in *Shurtleff v. City of Boston*, municipalities desiring to exercise discretion regarding the flags flown (and not flown) by private groups on public property should enact local policies that, among other things, identify the flags that groups can and cannot fly and what those flags communicate (e.g., the city's official sentiments).

In light of the decision in *City of Austin v. Reagan National Advertising of Austin*, municipalities should consider revisiting their sign codes to ensure that any distinctions between on-premises and off-premises signs are "location based and content-agnostic" and do not single out specific subject matter for different treatment.

Greetings NCFPD Retirees,

I would like to introduce you to my first NCFPD Annual Retiree Report. This is something that I want to provide all of you annually so that you all are kept informed of how NCF is doing.

We have had a very busy first year with our new administration. In the last few months, our Board has approved renovations to both fire stations 2 and 3 (Rainbow). Station 2 was a two-phase project. The first phase included renovation to the interior of the station including new flooring and paint throughout, a new kitchen, additional gear storage, and an added restroom. Over the next few months, we will launch phase two of the station 2 renovation which will include exterior paint, exterior lighting, exterior structural maintenance, landscaping, new garage doors/controllers, repairs to damaged driveway concrete, and additional employee/visitor parking. At Station 3 we will be removing the old modular building to make way for adding dorms, restrooms, workout facility, laundry facility, interior gear storage, and renovating the entire existing living quarters on the south side of the station.

Over at fire station 4 we are continuing to lift easements off the current site in preparation for building that station. A developing opportunity that may impact the construction of station 4 is the recent approval by the County of San Diego to purchase property at the south/east corner of Old Highway 395 and SR-76. The 18-acre parcel acquisition paves the way for a future San Diego County Sheriffs sub-station. We have expressed formal interest to the County of our desire to construct a new station 4 on a portion of that property, discussions are ongoing.

On the apparatus and equipment front we have a new type 1 engine, type 3 engine, ambulance, B/C and three admin staff trucks on order. We are also looking to transition our power hand tools from gas to electric. You would be surprised how far technology has advanced with battery power tools. We have two grant requests into AFG currently, one to upgrade our SCBAs, and the other to replace our VHF radios.

We were fortunate to have been awarded a \$105,000 grant last month for a Pump-Pod. This mobile training prop will allow our engineers to practice flowing lines while recirculating the water through a large tank saving thousands of gallons of water each year.

In May we deployed a single-role EMT ambulance to serve as a floating surge-capacity unit to the North Zone. This was done primarily to shore up the paramedic ambulance boundary drop system in North County. That unit is stationed out of Vista Station 6 and is netting revenue for our District. We continue to grow relationships with our neighboring agencies, so important!

Financially the District is doing well. We were able to add over \$4M to our reserves in the last 12 months (including \$3M from grants) which will go toward moving our facility, apparatus, and equipment projects forward. We are continuing to keep a close eye on our District Cal-PERS profile as well. A recent analysis showed our combined funding status at 89.1% which is considered excellent. We will continue to explore additional ways to shore up our future liabilities.

The state of North County Fire is strong. Standing on the shoulders of all of you, our team will continue to build a legacy of service and excellence as we continue to meet the ever expanding needs of our growing community.

Stay healthy and continue to enjoy your retirement.



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

CalPERS reports \$29 billion loss for the year, worst performance since Great Recession



The California Public Employees' Retirement System announced its first annual investment loss since the Great Recession on Wednesday, reporting a preliminary drop of 6.1% for the fiscal year that ended June 30.

Stocks and bonds lost the most value among the pension fund's holdings, following global trends, according to a CalPERS <u>statement</u>. Private equity and real estate investments gained, helping avoid a larger loss, the statement said.

The loss left the fund with a year-end value of \$440 billion, or 72% of what it would need to pay all its long-term obligations. That's down from 80% a year ago, when the fund was worth \$469 billion.

CalPERS is the largest public pension system in the U.S., providing pensions for about 2.1 million state and local government employees, retirees and beneficiaries.

The system's investment target for the year was a 6.8% gain. Falling short means California's state and local governments will have to make up for the loss with money that otherwise might have been spent on roads, parks and other budget items.

CalPERS' annual investment performance does not directly affect public

employees' pension contributions, since the <u>long-term debts associated with</u> <u>pension underfunding</u> are borne by public employers.

The losses follow a year of historic gains in 2021, when CalPERS earned 21.3% on its investments and public pensions.

Public market investments make up 79% of CalPERS' portfolio, the system said Wednesday. The fund's global stock investments lost 13.1% for the year, while fixed income investments — including treasuries and bonds — lost 14.5%, according to the release.

The fund's private equity investments returned 21.3%. Its real assets, including real estate, infrastructure and forestland, returned 24.1%.

"This is a unique moment in the financial markets, and we've seen a deviation from some investing fundamentals," Chief Investment Officer Nicole Musicco said in the release. "For instance, our traditional diversification strategies were less effective than expected, as we saw both public equity and fixed income assets fall in tandem."

The system has been working to expand its private equity holdings, but has encountered setbacks, included the <u>sudden resignation in 2020</u> of Chief Investment Officer Ben Meng.

Public pension plans across the country lost money due to the public market volatility of the last fiscal year, according to an analysis by the New York-based nonprofit Equable Institute.

The nonprofit recently estimated the plans lost an average of about 10.4%. Last year, the plans' gains averaged about 25%, according to Equable's analysis.

In 2009, CalPERS reported an annual loss of 24%. In the course of the Great Recession, the fund went from having 101% of what it would need to cover all its long-term debts to just 61%. It has not returned to full funding since then.

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
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Multi-Year LAFCO-Special Districts Collaboration Signed Into Law

On Friday, July 1, Governor Gavin Newsom signed <u>Senate Bill 938 (Hertzberg)</u> into law, a bill developed through an inclusive, thorough, multi-year working group process between CSDA, the California Association of Local Agency Formation Commissions (CALAFCO), and other stakeholders in response to recommendations by the Little Hoover Commission.

Importantly, SB 938 creates a new voter protest threshold for LAFCO-initiated dissolutions of special districts that meet specified criteria. Special districts meeting this criteria include those that:

- have one or more documented chronic service provision deficiencies;
- spent public funds in an unlawful or reckless manner inconsistent with the principal act or other statute governing the district;
- have shown willful neglect by failing to consistently adhere to the California Public Records Act and other public disclosure laws;
- have failed to meet the minimum number of times required in its principal act in the prior calendar year;
- have consistently failed to perform timely audits in the prior three years, or failed to meet minimum financial requirements under California Government Code; or
- have recent annual audits showing chronic issues with the district's fiscal controls

Special districts meeting one or more of the criteria above are entitled to a fair and procedurally-equitable process, where determinations for the proposed dissolution must be documented in a municipal services review (MSR) and presented at a public hearing. As part of this process, the affected special district will receive a one-year period to resolve the documented deficiency.

Additionally, SB 938 simplifies the statutes related to the conducting authority for LAFCOs to implement reorganizations of special districts, significantly reducing the number of cross-referenced statutes.

The provisions of this bill were fundamentally developed through a working group process that was responsive to a key Little Hoover Commission recommendation in its 2017 report "Special Districts: Improving Oversight & Transparency." As a key stakeholder, CSDA supported the passage of this bill

Southern California rattlesnakes are out and aggressive.

They started coming out in the spring and North County Fire Protection District has been out on many public service calls to remove them from residents' homes, garages and sheds.

According to NCFPD spokesperson John Choi, nine out of 10 calls for snake removals are rattlesnakes.

"We've flown a couple kids with bites to the hospital," he said.

Alex Trejo, of socalrattlesnakeremoval.com, has removed his fair share of snakes and has a keen understanding of them.

"Though rattlesnakes come out in the spring, the rattlesnake season is heaviest in the spring through the fall," Trejo said. It's the summer when they migrate into people's homes in search of food and water, and especially water, he emphasized.

Rattlesnakes aren't fond of summer heat so, to escape it, they seek out shaded areas, such as covered patios, outdoor furniture and potted patio plants. Potted patio plants are a favorite because they often have been watered and have water in the basins.

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Wildfire threat becomes tool to fight home builders

That's why he fiercely opposed a plan to build more than 1,100 homes in a fire-prone area he said would be difficult to evacuate safely. Brown sits on the local planning commission, and he said the additional people would clog the road out.

"It's a very rough area," Brown said. "We have fires all the time now."

Opponents like Brown, a member of the Sierra Club and California Native Plant Society, scored a win last year. A California court sided with a coalition of environmental groups and blocked a developer's plan called Otay Village 14 that included single-family homes and commercial space. The groups argued the county didn't adequately consider fire escape routes, and the judge agreed.




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Environmental groups are seeing increased success in California courts arguing that wildfire risk wasn't fully considered in proposals to build homes in fire-prone areas that sit at the edge of forests and brush, called the wildland-urban interface. Experts say such litigation could become more common.

California Attorney General Rob Bonta has backed a handful of the lawsuits, putting developers on notice.

"You can't keep doing things the way we've been doing when the world is changing around us," Bonta said in an interview, adding that he supports more housing. His office has, for example, questioned the increased fire risk of a 16,000-acre (6,475-hectare) project that includes a luxury resort and 385 residential lots in Lake County, roughly 130 miles (209 kilometers) north of San Francisco in an area that has already seen significant fire.

Bonta said his office is working on a policy that will help developers and local officials avoid future opposition from his office. It will provide guidance on evacuation routes, planning for population growth and minimizing fire risk, he said.

Developers say they already consider wildfire risks in their plans, comply with strict fire codes and adhere to state environmental policies, all while trying to ease another one of the state's most pressing problems: the need for more housing.


Builders also say communities sometimes unfairly wield wildfire risk as a tool to stop development. The AG's office has weighed in on this side, too. Last year, the city of Encinitas denied permits to an apartment complex citing the possibility of choked outgoing traffic if there were a fire.

Encinitas — a city with a median home price of \$1.67 million — was thwarting the state's

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The result is more lawsuits.

Opponents of the developments are employing the often-hated California Environmental Quality Act against local governments in these lawsuits. That law ensures there's enough information about projects like Otay Village 14 for officials to make informed decisions and address problems. In 2018, the state strengthened requirements for disclosing wildfire risk, leaving developers more vulnerable to this kind of litigation.

Peter Broderick, an attorney with the Center for Biological Diversity, said environmental groups are challenging "the worst of the worst," large projects in undeveloped, high fire-prone areas that cater to wealthy buyers.

"We're talking about sprawl," Broderick said.

Pro-housing advocates have said the state's policies encourage sprawl.

MAJOR HOUSING NEED

But by fighting big developments, environmental groups are holding up thousands of homes, said Mark Dillon, an attorney who represented the Otay Village 14 builders. New developments take fire risk seriously, employing techniques for fire-resistance and complying with building codes, he said. Otay Village 14 would build its own fire station.

California shouldn't just focus on building in city centers, Dillon countered.

"We shouldn't be outlawing the single family home," he said.

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unit development.

"It's on the main street of an existing community," she said. "And why is this a problem?"

Calabasas City Manager Kindon Meik said the project would violate open space rules and was in a high-risk area that had recently burned, adding the city has plans to meet its new housing needs.

California's housing shortage has made homes unaffordable for many moderate and low-income residents. Researchers, housing policy experts, and others say development at the edge of the forest has been driven in part by these punishing home costs in cities like Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco and their suburbs.

In recent years, the state passed measures aimed at ensuring cities build enough new homes, but a recent statewide housing plan said 2.5 million new homes are still needed over the next eight years.

Greg Pierce, a professor of urban environmental policy at the University of California, Los Angeles, said there's very little land left in California that is undeveloped, cheap and at low risk of fire.

Meanwhile, activists have more projects in their crosshairs.

NeySa Ely of Escondido has a list of items like medicine and dog supplies to grab the next time she has to flee a fire. She had to evacuate in 2003 and 2007. The first time, she remembers driving away and seeing flames in the rearview mirror.

"At that point, I just started sobbing," Ely said.

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

A 21-year-old man was arrested on suspicion of possessing an estimated 500 pounds of fireworks found in his garage and illegal sales of fireworks, the San Diego County Sheriff's Department said Sunday.

Natanael Garcia was booked Sunday into the Vista Detention Facility on felony charges of possessing more than 100 pounds of fireworks and illegal sales of fireworks. His bail was set at \$20,000 and he was scheduled to be arraigned Tuesday, according to jail records.



The fireworks were found just before 7 p.m. Saturday in the 200 block of East View Street in Fallbrook, authorities said.

Are Fireworks Illegal in San Diego? Carlsbad? Chula Vista? Anywhere?



Anybody found violating local laws regarding fireworks could be fined up to \$50,000 and sent to jail for up to one year, according to Cal Fire.

Fireworks are illegal in San Diego County. Under California law, it is illegal to make, possess, manufacture, sell, transport or use fireworks. Fireworks include sky rockets, bottle rockets, roman candles, aerial shells, firecrackers, sparklers and many others that go into the air or move on the ground in an uncontrollable manner.

Violators face up to a year in jail and \$50,000 in fines. Parents are liable for any injury or damage caused by their children using fireworks.

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Retirement Funding Strategies for Past and Future Costs

It's no secret that most government pension plans are underfunded throughout California. With fewer assets than liabilities, these underfunded pension plans are not projected to fulfill benefits that have been promised to plan members. So, what is the best way to address these underfunded pension plans? Many agencies see pension liabilities grow on their balance sheet year after year and recognize sizable pension expense as a result. The reality is that pension costs can't be stopped and can only hope to be contained.

However, fiscally responsible strategies can be implemented to reduce past and future retirement costs. Many factors involved in pension liability calculations are unable to be controlled, but with proper action, the time value of money can be turned into an advantage. There is no one-size-fits-all answer, but below are some general guidelines to assist in addressing each unique situation.

Review your agency's Unfunded Accrued Liability (UAL) annually. If your agency contracts with the California Public Employee Retirement System (CalPERS) you are probably familiar with UAL. This is the difference between current plan assets that CalPERS holds on your behalf and the estimated future benefits previously earned by plan members. On average, most agencies are around 70% funded, meaning that plan assets are underfunded by 30%.

Understand interest costs associated with carrying the UAL over time. CalPERS requires minimum payments annually to pay down the UAL over a period of 24 years. Think of this like a minimum payment on a credit card each month. Paying only the minimum payment on a credit card results in higher interest costs. Correspondingly, a higher UAL balance over a longer period of times results in higher interest costs for a pension plan.

CalPERS currently charges 6.8% on shortfalls of plan assets.

Determine potential savings by funding the pension plan directly. CalPERS releases an annual valuation for your agency, and it displays a 24-year amortization schedule with associated payments. It also projects interest savings over time using 10 and 15-year periods. Agencies can lock into a "hard fresh start" with CalPERS by moving to a 10-year or 15-year amortization period. Recent valuations have shown that an agency with a \$2.8 million UAL could save an estimated \$1.1 million in interest costs by moving to a 10year period. Agencies can also mirror shorter amortization periods without locking into a schedule by making Additional Discretionary Payments (ADPs) for payment differences between the required period and a shorter period. This method is known as a "soft fresh start" with CalPERS because it is voluntary, and ADPs can be discontinued. Strategize to fund ADPs with onetime windfalls or excess cash reserves. Contact your CalPERS actuary to understand available options and savings.

Establish a UAL funding target. UAL is constantly changing, and the goal is not actually to become 100% funded with assets in a pension plan. Money sent into CalPERS is locked into the plan. Agencies should target anywhere

from 90-95% funding. This range eliminates unreasonable interest costs while allowing room for investment performance or actuarial assumptions to make up the 5-10% difference. Becoming over 100% funded in CalPERS becomes frozen capital as it cannot be withdrawn or used for another purpose.

Establish a 115 Pension Trust
Fund (115 Trust). Pension trusts
are a funding vehicle used to prefund
future retirement costs. Once funds are
deposited into this irrevocable trust,
they can only be withdrawn for funding
retirement benefits. Investments in the
trust grow over time and can be used
as a rainy-day fund for retirement costs
during challenging economic times.
Benefits of a Section 115 trust include
but are not limited to:

- Voluntary contributions can be adjusted in amount and frequency by the agency.
- Investment flexibility and risk diversification. Trust assets can be invested in higher-yielding instruments when compared to conventional investments such as LAIF or County pools.
- Smooths annual budgeting by absorbing future pension cost volatility due to market fluctuations or changes in assumptions.
- Selection of asset allocation strategy to match agency risk tolerance and investment time horizon.

 Flexibility to access trust assets if used to pay employer pension costs, including normal costs and UAL payments (rainy-day retirement fund).

Of course, all investment vehicles carry the risk of losing principal in a down market – consult your CPA on whether a trust is right for your agency.

Source funding for pension plan payments. Where will the money come from to make ADPs into CalPERS and fund a 115 Pension Trust? There are a few options available.

- Excess cash reserves otherwise invested in LAIF or another investment vehicle with lower yield.
- One-time windfalls of cash due to the sale of assets, or unexpected revenue rebates.
- Unexpected excess revenues over expenses.
- Pension obligation bonds (POBs)
 during periods of low interest rates.
 If CalPERS is charging 6.8% on
 shortfalls of plan assets and POBs
 can be issued at 2-3% then interest
 savings are possible. However, there
 is always risk involved because
 proceeds are placed into pension plan
 investments. If CalPERS investments

perform poorly, it will be difficult to recover. The agency's financial position could be worse than before issuing the bonds in some scenarios.

Develop an Unfunded Accrued Liability (UAL) Pension Management Policy. Agencies should identify goals, strategies, and various funding options for retirement costs. The policy should address a pension plan funding target, ensure that pension funding decisions protect current and future stakeholders, and create transparency as to how and why the pension plan is being funded.

Review the UAL Pension
Management Policy annually. Ensure
compliance with the adopted policy and
be sure to update annually with changing
conditions. A properly designed UAL
policy tailored to your agency helps
defray growing retirement liabilities
and conveys a sense of fiduciary duty to
stakeholders.

In short, it is crucial to review and understand costs associated with retirement plans, establish funding goals, and develop policies to address liabilities over the long-term. Start developing a fiscally responsible strategy that works for your agency today.

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Wildfire Season Is Coming Is Your District Prepared?

he California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection's (CAL FIRE) 2022 forecast confirms California will continue to experience longer wildfire seasons. This year, extended dryness with little perception will leave most of the state in moderate to extreme drought conditions which will increase the potential for wildland fire activity.

We don't know where the wildfires will hit, but we do know they are coming. What steps can your district take to mitigate the effects of wildfires? How can your district become resilient during this ever-changing exposure? Read on for guidance on detecting your district's vulnerabilities, the importance of planning ahead, and what to do after a fire disaster.

Evaluating Your District's Risk Of Wildfires

Existing law requires CAL FIRE to identify "very high fire hazard severity zones" in the state, based on specified criteria. It also requires agencies, located in the high-hazard severity zones, to have an elevated defensible space program.


We all know wildfires can spread throughout the state, but it would be useful to determine if your district is located within an established high hazard severity zone. The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) has developed a searchable map where users can select their location or enter an address to identify their fire threat. Go to cpuc.ca.gov and search 'Fire Threat Maps and Fire Safety Rulemaking' and select the HFTD Map – GIS web app viewer link. Note: This tool was last updated August 29, 2021, and it is not considered an official CAL FIRE map.

Even if your district is not considered to be in the highhazard zone, it is still recommended to implement the following strategies.

PLAN AHEAD

Protecting Property and Buildings

Protecting your property and buildings is a key consideration in mitigating wildfire losses. Evaluating your vulnerabilities will help you identify actions prior to a wildfire.




Creating defensible space around your property

Defensible space is meant to slow the spread of wildfires. It is a buffer created between a building and the landscape or wildland area surrounding it. CAL FIRE outlines the defensible space zones at readyforwildfire.org. Remember to check your local government and fire agencies for any additional defensible space or weed abatement ordinance requirements. Please note, the outlined information is a condensed version of CAL FIRE's defensible space zone criteria. Refer to the readyforwildfire website for additional details.

• Zone 1 – Lean, Clean and Green Zone - Extends 30 feet from buildings, structures, and decks, or the property line, whichever is closer. Remove all dead foliage, such as plants, grass, weeds, leaves, and pine needles. Also remove leaves and pine needles from building roofs and rain gutters. Trim trees to keep branches at least 10 feet from other trees and remove branches that hang over the roof. Remove or prune flammable plants, especially near windows. If there is a chimney, keep dead branches 10 feet away and relocate wood piles to Zone 2. Contact CAL FIRE for additional clearance requirements if your district has commercial gas storage tanks or other flammable materials storage buildings.

- Zone 2 Reduce Fuel Zone Extends from 30 feet to 100 feet out from buildings, structures, decks, etc. or to the property line, whichever is closer. Ensure grass is cut to more than 4 inches and remove fallen leaves, needles, twigs, bark, cones, and small branches. It is critical to have adequate spacing between grass, shrubs, and trees to reduce the spread of wildfire. Spacing is determined by the type and size of plants and trees as well as the slope of the land. Review the CAL FIRE guidance on horizontal and vertical plant and tree spacing. Ensure exposed wood piles have at least 10 feet of clearance in all directions.
- Zone o (Coming in 2023) Assembly Bill 3074 requires a third ember-resistant zone within 0-5 feet of buildings. The Bill requires the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection to develop the regulation by January 1, 2023. The emberresistant is designed to keep fire or embers from igniting materials that can spread the fire directly to buildings.

Consider fire smart landscaping as an added measure of protection. CAL FIRE urges the use of "fire-resistant plants that are strategically planted to resist the spread of fire to your buildings". Fire resistant plants are often drought tolerant, as well. Additional information is available at readyforwildfire.org.



Hardening your buildings against wildfires

There are generally three ways your buildings can be exposed to wildfire; direct flames from a wildfire or other neighboring burning buildings, radiant heat from nearby burning plants or structures; or flying embers. Flying embers from a wildfire can destroy buildings up to a mile away and are responsible for the destruction of most homes during a wildfire.

- Roofs Wood or shingle roofs are at high risk of being
 destroyed during a wildfire. Materials such as composition,
 metal, clay, or tile are recommended. Remove vegetative
 debris from roofs and keep rain gutters clear or enclose rain
 gutters to prevent accumulation of plant debris.
- Vents Cover vent openings with tightly woven metal mesh to reduce openings for flying embers. Consider ember and flame-resistant vents such as Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) vents.
- Windows Wildfire heat can cause windows to break
 even before the building is on fire which allows flying
 embers to enter the building. Single-paned and large
 windows are particularly vulnerable. Consider dual-paned
 windows to reduce of breakage. Installing screens may also
 reduce embers from entering the building. Remember to
 keep plants trimmed near windows.

CAL FIRE provides additional guidance on fire resistant materials for walls, decks, and other areas at readyforwildfire.org.

Conducting an asset inventory

Make certain your interior and exterior assets are documented, preferably with photos and/or videos. Document information such as building names, values, content values, GPS coordinates, property descriptions, serial numbers, purchase and replacement cost values, etc. Make duplicates and store this information in a secure location.

Developing Emergency Response Programs and **Procedures**

Planning ahead includes developing emergency response procedures to guide your district when an emergency event occurs. Taking the time to develop customized plans is essential; however, it's equally important to train, test, and practice the procedures to ensure they are effective. If you already have procedures in place, it's a good time to ensure they are up to date.

Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP)

Public entities today face challenges unlike any that have been seen before. In addition to natural causes, such as wildfires and floods, man-made causes such as civil unrest,



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terrorism, transportation accidents, technology failures, and disease pandemics have triggered major service disruptions to both public and private operations.

Continuity of operations planning is part of the fundamental mission of public entities. The changing threat environment and the severity of natural and man-made disasters highlight the need for careful continuity of operations planning that enables agencies to continue their essential functions across a broad spectrum of emergencies disrupting normal operations.

The COOP process focuses on two questions, (1) what operations performed by the district are critical and essential? and (2) what resources are required to continue those essential operations during an emergency or disruption. FEMA has identified the following elements the COOP should cover:

- · Essential Functions and Services
- · Orders of Succession
- · Delegation of Authority
- · Devolution (transfer of authority)
- Continuity Facilities (alternate locations)
- · Communications
- · Vital Records Management
- Human Capital (critical staff to the essential functions and services)

- · Training, testing, and exercises
- Reconstitution (pathway to returning to daily operations)

Development resources are available at fema.gov. FEMA has developed a Continuity Resource Toolkit to provide agencies at all levels of government, with tools, templates, and resources to help develop and maintain a successful continuity program.

Wildfire Emergency Recovery Assistance Plan

The optimum time to identify emergency recovery resources is before a wildfire incident occurs. Research local, state, and federal resources available to your district as well as your employees and develop an action plan that will be ready if needed. Resources:

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Emergency Action Plan - CCR Title 8, 3220

Cal/OSHA requires California employers to have an Emergency Action Plan (EAP) in place. The purpose of the EAP is to establish emergency response procedures to safeguard employees and on-site visitors in the event of an emergency. It outlines evacuation procedures, shelter-in-place procedures, emergency kits, emergency shelter in place supplies, and other relevant procedures based on potential emergencies that may occur.

In addition to general procedures, the EAP should include procedures for specific types of emergencies, such as building fires, earthquakes, floods, utility outage, etc. In addition to your building fire procedures, it is recommended that you add procedures on wildfire response, for example:

- A system to monitor wildfire incidents near your district.
 You can sign up to receive current information about active wildfires near you through the readyforwildfire.org site.
- Identifying your local emergency response contacts and evacuation centers. As well as information on evacuation routes and other pertinent information.
- Ensuring enough water and non-perishable supplies are available to last up to three days.
- Determining early employee evacuation conditions designed to allow employees to return home and manage

their personal wildfire planning. We encourage you to share the CAL FIRE resources with your employees so they can have a wildfire plan in place.


Fire Prevention Plan - CCR 3221

Cal/OSHA also requires California employers to have a Fire Prevention Plan (FPP). The FPP is different than an EAP because it focuses on the fire control equipment and systems in place. Procedures must be developed to identify potential fire hazards, ignitions sources, and control measures.

Wildfire Smoke - CCR Title 8, 5141.1

During a wildfire incident your district may require employees to work outdoors, which may expose them to unhealthy air. Cal/OSHA has adopted the Wildfire Smoke Standard to help protect employees under these conditions. The standard applies to worksites where the current Air Quality Index (AQI) for airborne particulate matter (PM2.5) is 151 or greater and where it is reasonably anticipated employees could be exposed to wildfire smoke. When the standard applies, employers are required to do conduct the following:

 Check the AQI - In the event of a wildfire, employers must check the current AQI for PM 2.5 periodically throughout each shift. An Airnow.gov app is available. If the trigger of 151 is ever exceeded employers must conduct training



outlined Cal/OSHA's Section 5141.1 Appendix B.

- Reduce the exposure Employers must identify ways to lower employee exposure to wildfire smoke, where feasible. Such as:
 - · Locate work indoors or in vehicles where the air is filtered
 - Change procedures to allow work to be moved to a location where the AQI is lower
 - · Reduce work time in areas without filtered air
 - · Increase time and frequency of breaks in filtered air
 - Lower the physical intensity of work to lower breathing and heart rates
- Provide respiratory protection Employers must provide or require respirators for employees working outdoors depending on the PM 2.5 airborne levels.
 - Voluntary Use If the employee exposure cannot be reduced to an AQI of 151 or less of PM 2.5, then employees must be provided with respirators, such a N95 masks for voluntary use.
 - Required Use Respirator use is mandatory or required when the AQI exceeds 500 for PM 2.5. Employees must receive a medical clearance, respirator fit testing and training prior to wearing a respirator under these conditions.
- Note: The following workplaces and operations are exempt from this standard:
 - Enclosed buildings or structures where the air is filtered by a mechanical ventilation system
 - Enclosed vehicles where the air is filtered by a cabin air filter
 - The AQI for PM2.5 is below 151
 - Employees who are exposed to a current AQI for PM2.5 of 151 or greater for a total of one hour or less during a shift

· Firefighters engaged in wildland firefighting

DURING THE WILDFIRE

When advised by emergency authorities to evacuate, do so immediately and follow your EAP evacuation procedures; modifications may be needed based on the conditions. If ordered not to evacuate follow, your EAP shelter-in place procedures. Make sure employees and on-site guests are accounted for and safe. If you have any injured employees or guests, call 911. If it's safe to do so monitor boilers and check for pipe breakage, fires, and other damages. Call emergency responders if warranted.

RECOVERY

After the wildfire consider the following:

- If your district's property has been damaged by a wildfire incident, contact your property & liability provider.
 They will provide direction on the next steps, including mitigating additional damage, remedial actions to take, submitting a claims process, and other guidance.
- Review your COOP to ensure your district's plan to continue essential operations during this disruption is operational. Make adjustments as warranted.
- If you have employees who are required to work outdoors during this time, ensure you are providing the proper personal protective equipment and continue to monitor the Air Quality index.
- If approved to return to your property be aware of potential hazards, such as gas leaks, broken glass, damaged electrical wiring, etc. If in doubt have your building inspected by a qualified inspector before entering.
- Review your Wildfire Recovery Assistance Plan and take action.

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

The Clerk of the County Assessment Appeals Board, Andrew Potter, announced the filing period Thursday.

up and speak with Clerk of the Board staff at the County Administration Center, 1600 Pacific Highway, Room 402, San Diego, CA 92101-2471.

To file an appeal application, taxpayers should know their parcel or tax bill number, property address, and must state their opinion of the property's market value on the application. Applications must be received by the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors Office no later than 5 p.m. on Nov. 30 or postmarked by midnight of Nov. 30.

County Breaks Ground for First Affordable Housing Development on Surplus Property

In a first for the County, officials broke ground on a surplus property that will transform an empty lot into a site for low-income affordable housing.

Thursday's groundbreaking marks the start of construction for the Levant Street Cottages in the Linda Vista neighborhood of the City of San Diego. The site once housed a County Child Welfare Services building.

The cottages will go up on a 4.57-acre plot of land and include 127 independent living and affordable senior housing units expected to house 150 people. At least 20% of the units will go toward seniors with 50% or less of the area

median income. The rest will go to seniors with 60% or less.

The County is working with Wakeland Housing and Development, and San Diego Kind Corporations to develop the property. The developers will lease the land for a \$1 a year and pay an annual \$10,000 administrative payment to the County. The housing units will remain affordable for 70 years.

The San Diego Housing Commission provided 70 project-based vouchers. The state provided \$23 million in tax credits and \$19 million in Multifamily Housing Program funds.

Construction on the Levant Street Cottages is scheduled for completion in early 2024.

Since 2017, the County has invested \$175 million toward creating **affordable housing** in the region. Seven other excess County properties are slated for affordable housing.



North County Fire Protection District engines and ambulance responded. California Highway Patrol is investigating.

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
